In a move described as "unprecedented and unacceptable," Egypt has ordered the closure of the <u>Monastery of Saint</u> <u>Catherine of Sinai</u>, the world's oldest continuously functioning Christian monastery. This decision has sparked outrage from religious leaders and surprise within the Greek government, despite recent high-level diplomatic assurances.

Archbishop leronymos of Athens and All <u>Greece</u> reacted with palpable anger, lamenting in a statement, "Yet another historic Fall that Hellenism and Orthodoxy are experiencing."

Information suggests a prevailing sense of bewilderment within the Greek government, given that the issue had reportedly been addressed during a meeting between Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis and Egyptian President Abdel Fattah el-Sisi earlier this month. The Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs is now handling the crisis, acknowledging its utmost importance.
